

It's time to incentivize more housing development and core infrastructure

Housing

- Housing policy that works for the **needs of all communities** not just big cities. 70%
 of Manitobans agree
- Avoid one-size-fits-all approaches. Avoid cookie-cutter policy like incentives for only multi-unit development which does little for many small communities
- Respect and maintain local decision-making and control with respect to zoning, land use and development permitting
- Federal investment is the real barrier to home construction: shortage of **fully serviced land** in particular, investments in water and wastewater infrastructure

Core Infrastructure Investments

- Direct federal funding for essential water and wastewater projects treatment plants, sewer pipes, and sewage lagoons. 83% of Manitobans agree
- Clarity on planned federal involvement and investments in local housing-enabling core infrastructure
- Permanently double the Canada Community-Building Fund (CCBF) for funding predictability and helping advance community growth projects
- Advance the Port of Churchill Plus initiative to the Major Projects Office. A model project for next-generation Crown-Municipal-Indigenous cooperation with potential for 2,000-6,000 jobs and \$1 billion in annual GDP growth



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Contract Policing

- ✓ More federal funding for policing
- 72% of Manitobans agree, with rural and northern communities leading that call
- A continued RCMP role in local policing.

 Clarity is needed now and if the federal government does intend to proceed with contract renewal negotiations, municipalities must be at the table and meaningfully consulted
- Manitoba also has the highest vacancy rate for RCMP. If the federal police force maintains its policing role, we need a fully staffed RCMP deployment
- Municipal contract partners must be meaningfully consulted during RCMP collective bargaining negotiations and future policing discussions. Make sure policy changes are appropriate to local policing needs, and affordability is considered when making changes

Bail & Sentencing Reform

- Manitoba has among the highest rates of violent crime in Canada
- 69% of Manitobans are worried about crime, and that concern is growing
- Immediate bail reform and Criminal Code changes to hold repeat offenders accountable 9 in 10 Manitobans agree
- Reverse onus bail and parole for violent and repeat offenders, including violent organized crime and home break-ins
- First responder protection similar to that given to peace officers: increased maximum terms and penalties for aggravated assault against paramedics, firefighters, and other first responders



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
